Our Board of Directors is a volunteer group of community leaders and individuals who share a deep concern for the welfare of animals. They lend time, professional skills, expertise and talents in a variety of fields, as well as financial support to the organization. The Board meets bi-monthly and is responsible for the governance, policies, programs, and financial condition of the SPCA of Luzerne County as the organization seeks to fulfill its mission.

The SPCA of Luzerne County's primary services are represented by the three foundational pillars of our mission: Protecting the abandoned, neglected, and abused animals of our county through Humane Society Police work; providing companion animal educational opportunities in our community from pre-school to seniors; and providing respite care and adoption programs for unwanted and abandoned animals, offering a second chance at a new life for the thousands of animals that find themselves in our care each year. We have a flourishing volunteer program, providing many varied ways to help our organization with the important work we do on behalf of the animals. In addition to helping us care for the animals, our volunteer program offers a multitude of opportunities for people of various physical and mental abilities, allowing them a chance to experience life at an animal shelter with heartwarming results.

How is the SPCA of Luzerne County funded?

Your SPCA is a private, non-profit, 501(c)3, local animal welfare organization founded in 1957 by a group of concerned citizens who recognized the need to protect those who could not protect themselves. Like most animal welfare organizations, we are not affiliated with any other shelter and do not have a parent organization. We are not, in any way, a government agency. We are supported by the generosity of individuals, organizations, and corporations through monetary and in-kind donations, participation in our yearly events, and through bequest and trust giving. In 2018, we started contracting with local municipalities as their service provider for stray cats and dogs. These contracts provide additional funding each year.

MISSION STATEMENT:

The SPCA of Luzerne County uplifts our community by providing compassion, comfort, and care to domestic companion animals through education, advocacy, protection, and a shelter/adoption program.

Services Offered

SPAY AND NEUTER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Spaying/Neutering your pet is the only effective way to reduce the pet overpopulation problem. We realize that this vital surgery can be cost prohibitive for some families in our community. The SPCA of Luzerne County has offered a spay/neuter assistance program (S/NAP) for more than 15 years offering financial assistance for low income households in our county. S/NAP spays/neuters over 600 house cats per year, made possible through the generosity of private donations and the cooperation of several area veterinarians.

Over 12,500 cats have been spayed or neutered since the beginning.

SENIOR PARTNERS

We offer a senior-to-senior adoption program; providing low cost adoptions to senior citizens who choose to provide a loving home to a senior pet.



END-OF-LIFE SERVICES

Although no one wants to say goodbye to their beloved pet, we are here to help when that time comes. We offer humane euthanasia services and cremation with return or burial of cremains. Our Rolling Green Pet Cemetery is the final resting place for hundreds of cherished pets. We can assist you in making these difficult final decisions showing deep respect for your companion.

ADOPTION

Our adoption counselors are here to help make the transition from shelter to home easier for both your new furry friend and your family.



Income for 2023










Expenses for 2023




Bandit


"There is a bulletin board in our shelter that everyone sees, but tries to block out. It's a disturbing 6 square feet of graphic words and photos of humane cases. Unfortunately, the work our Humane Society Police Officers do is, in many respects, our most important work. There are hundreds of calls that come in and dozens of cases that go to court every year, but there is always one that haunts us the most. Last year it was Bandit.





On July 11, 2022, we received a phone call about a dog named Bandit. The caller had seen his neighbor choke Bandit with his leash, stand on top of him, throw him in a grave he had dug, and when Bandit moved, stabbed him multiple times with a shovel. Another person had also seen it happen. Armed with this information, our Humane Officers confirmed





The suspect was charged with Felony 3 torture, Felony 3 reckless ill-treatment, and Misdemeanor 3 reckless ill-treatment. At the arraignment, the suspect was released on \$25,000 bail and ordered not to live with animals. A short time later our Humane Officers found him living in the same residence with multiple animals. He failed to adequately explain why he had violated the terms of his bail. A warrant was issued, he was arrested in a different county, and extradited back to Luzerne County where he was kept in custody until the hearing.

On June 1, 2023, the suspect was finally before a magistrate, pleading guilty to one felony and one misdemeanor. With credit for time served, he was imprisoned for 2 additional months. After a total of 9 months, he was released on parole and forbidden to own any pets, but was allowed to live with animals that were not his own.

It's hard to decide if this was a victory or not. We will continue to fight for tougher laws and stricter prosecution of current laws. Our Humane Society Police Officers will keep responding to over 700 initial calls of abuse and neglect every year and all of us will work to speak out for those with no voices of their own.... like Bandit."





OUR BONDED ADOPTIONS

There is no doubt that adopting a pet gives you all the best feelings. You just cannot beat the warmth in your heart when that pet knows it is finally home and curls up on your couch next to you. What feeling can be better than adopting a pet? Maybe, adopting two! Sometimes you will see a "bonded pair" up for adoption and wonder "Why are they bonded?" There is a variety of reasons pets are bonded when they come into the shelter, but the main reason is that they lived together prior to being at the shelter. It's best to keep them together. You might think "Why should an adopter take home a bonded pair?" There are a variety of reasons that start with separation anxiety. There are plenty of times when a pair of pets come into the shelter and even separated for a brief moment, one or both will become extremely nervous. Keeping pets together in a new environment, like the shelter or their new home, will help them adjust. On top of that, two pets will keep each other entertained when the humans are not there. They will continue to play and exercise even when you are not home, stimulating both mind and muscle which helps fight boredom and potentially keeps them out of major mischief. One last reason, especially for cats and bunnies, they help groom each other.


Penuchi adopted by Kevin C.
