
A message from the desk of the Executive Director

The SPCA of Luzerne County's staff and army of volunteers have worked tirelessly throughout 2019 to embody the values represented by the three pillars of our mission: Education, Humane Society Police work, and Shelter/Adoption Programs. In 2019 we enjoyed many successes. We expanded our educational offerings, weaving education into nearly every service our organization provides, from educating our adopters on the best care of their new family member to teaching those accused of cruelty what they need to change in order to improve conditions for their animals. Our dedicated team of Humane Society Police Officers continues to respond to the hundreds of cruelty and neglect calls that flood our phone lines each year. We have also improved the level of care our resident animals receive here at the shelter by employing a full time veterinarian and significantly upgrading our veterinary equipment and procedures. Adoptions policies have been tweaked to improve our animals' chances at finding the best forever home. All of this requires your support. Together we can make a lasting difference in the lives of our furry friends.

As we work our way through 2020 we have the constant reminder of wet noses and wagging tails telling us not to lose sight of our goals for the animals in our community who so desperately need our help. You will also read about Karma, a beautiful dog with an unbreakable spirit. This sweetheart touched our lives and changed us all for the better. Our look toward the future is bright and filled with hope. We remain committed to strive for excellence in the services we offer and in the shelter our animals temporarily call home. With your continued help, we will grow our educational offerings from pre-school to senior citizens. Exciting plans are being developed to launch a major building improvement project in the next few years- setting our sights on a more functional space improving the sheltering of our animals available for adoption as well as upgraded, dedicated space for animals receiving veterinary care, and more useful space for community outreach. Of course, none of these improvements will be possible without all of you. It has always been, and will continue to be, your kindness and generosity that pave the way for a future filled with love, caring, and hope for our less fortunate furry friends.

MISSION STATEMENT:

The SPCA's mission is the prevention of cruelty to animals by providing:

- Shelter for unwanted, discarded, neglected, and often abused animals.
- An adoption program to place these animals into caring, permanent homes.
- Humane education programs to enlighten the public about animal problems.
- Humane law enforcement and prosecution programs to address animal cruelty.



What contributions does your SPCA make to the community?

The SPCA of Luzerne County's primary services are represented by the three foundational pillars of our mission: Protecting the abandoned, neglected, and abused animals of our county through Humane Society Police work; providing companion animal educational opportunities in our community from pre-school to seniors; and providing respite care and adoption programs for unwanted and abandoned animals, offering a second chance at a new life for the thousands of animals that find themselves in our care each year. We have a flourishing volunteer program, providing many varied ways to help our organization with the important work we do on behalf of the animals. In addition to helping us care for the animals, our volunteer program offers a multitude of opportunities for people of various physical and mental abilities, allowing them a chance to experience life at an animal shelter with heartwarming results.

How is the SPCA of Luzerne County funded?

Your SPCA is a private, non-profit, 501(c)3, local animal welfare organization founded in 1957 by a group of concerned citizens who recognized the need to protect those who could not protect themselves. Like most animal welfare organizations, we are not affiliated with any other shelter and do not have a parent organization. We are not, in any way, a government agency. We are supported by the generosity of individuals, organizations, and corporations through monetary and in-kind donations, participation in our yearly events, and through bequest and trust giving. In 2018, we started contracting with local municipalities as their service provider for stray cats and dogs. These contracts provide additional funding each year.

Our Board of Directors is a volunteer group of community leaders and individuals who share a deep concern for the welfare of animals. They lend time, professional skills, expertise and talents in a variety of fields, as well as financial support to the organization. The Board meets bi-monthly and is responsible for the governance, policies, programs, and financial condition of the SPCA of Luzerne County as the organization seeks to fulfill its mission.

Services Offered



SPAY AND NEUTER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Spaying/Neutering your pet is the only effective way to reduce the pet overpopulation problem. We realize that this vital surgery can be cost prohibitive for some families in our community. The SPCA of Luzerne County has offered a spay/neuter assistance program (S/NAP) for the past 10 years offering financial assistance for low income households in our county. S/NAP spays/neuters over 600 cats per year, made possible through the generosity of private donations and the cooperation of several area veterinarians.

SENIOR PARTNERS

We offer a senior-to-senior adoption program; providing low cost adoptions to senior citizens who chose to provide a loving home to a senior pet.



END OF LIFE SERVICES

Although no one wants to say goodbye to their beloved pet, we are here to help when that time comes. We offer humane euthanasia services and cremation with return or burial of cremains. Our Rolling Green Pet Cemetery is the final resting place for hundreds of cherished pets. We can assist you in making these difficult final decisions showing deep respect for your companion.

PRISON PROGRAM

Partnering with Hunlock SCI, selected shelter dogs are paired with a specific group of inmates for training over a 6-12 week period of time. This is a wonderful program that give dogs a vacation from the shelter and the inmates a positive and productive way to spend their time. The program is referred to as "A New Leash on Life". Twelve dogs went through this program in 2019 and have all found homes.





ADOPTION

Our adoption counselors are here to help make the transition from shelter to home easier for both your new furry friend and your family.

Before adoption, make sure to:

Decide who will do what: grooming, feeding, exercising, cleaning, and playing. Establish your new pet's area in the house.

Stock up on all needed supplies like food, treats, pee pads, litter, and toys. Pet proof your home as needed.

Learn how to slowly introduce your new friend to other pets in the house.





June, 2019 20+ Cats Living in Filth



We've certainly seen it many times before. One of our humane officers enters a house unfit for humans or animals. It is impossible to walk without stepping in filth. It is impossible to breath with the extreme ammonia content in the air making your eyes burn. It is impossible to ignore the fleas that have found your bare skin and started to bite. It would be easy to throw down some food and walk away, but there are more than 20 cats dying a slow, horrible death here. Some had already succumbed.

It took us several days of setting traps to catch all of the cats and get them back to the shelter. Some of the smallest and the weakest were barely alive and suffering immensely. Sadly many didn't make it. None had any experience with loving, human contact.

The two women who lived in this house likely started out trying to save a few cats and then a few more, quickly going from a rescue attempt to a full-blown hoarding situation. The cats were suffering. It was out of control.

Cases like this are the reason why we have a low cost spay/neuter assistance program for low income cat owners. This is why we have a humane education program to teach children and community groups about responsible, compassionate pet ownership. This is also why we need three humane police officers responding to almost 1,000 calls each year about animal abuse and neglect.

We have made huge strides, but there is so much more to be done. Please help us by giving generously today.



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KARMA: Changed our lives in 2019

Karma was a pit mix living in some of the most deplorable conditions our humane officers had ever seen. Confined in a tiny crate surrounded by more than 3 dozen cats, she had a bent, broken tail, major skin problems and that was just what was immediately apparent. This dog's life had been horrible, but somehow she was the most loving and happy dog we had ever met. That broken tail would wag like crazy, as she flopped on her back to have her belly rubbed. She climbed on every lap she could find, covering faces with kisses. She deserved the very best home. But Karma still faced numerous obstacles. She had medical issues like mammary tumors and skin problems. We removed the tumors and continually treated the skin through diet and medication. Her case was tied up in the courts. We finally gained custody. The biggest obstacle turned out to be that she could not be around other dogs. So many potential adopters fell in love, but already had other dogs.

Many months passed until finally Harrisburg Humane Society said that they felt they could find her a home, so with tears in our eyes we said goodbye to this sweetheart, hoping she was finally headed for the home she deserved. More medical issues came up, making adoption seem unlikely, but in the end Karma went to live out her days on a fabulous farm.

Karma has been seen about town doing a ride-along with a Harrisburg Police Officer and running around fields of green. We miss you Karma, but we are glad the long fight we went through, got you what you deserved, a happily-ever-after ending.




