## SPCA 2022-2023 Board of Directors

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Our Board of Directors is a volunteer group of community leaders and individuals who share a deep concern for the welfare of animals. They lend time, professional skills, expertise and talents in a variety of fields, as well as financial support to the organization. The Board meets bi-monthly and is responsible for the governance, policies, programs, and financial condition of the SPCA of Luzerne County as the organization seeks to fulfill its mission.

The SPCA of Luzerne County's primary services are represented by the three foundational pillars of our mission: Protecting the abandoned, neglected, and abused animals of our county through Humane Society Police work; providing companion animal educational opportunities in our community from pre-school to seniors; and providing respite care and adoption programs for unwanted and abandoned animals, offering a second chance at a new life for the thousands of animals that find themselves in our care each year. We have a flourishing volunteer program, providing many varied ways to help our organization with the important work we do on behalf of the animals. In addition to helping us care for the animals, our volunteer program offers a multitude of opportunities for people of various physical and mental abilities, allowing them a chance to experience life at an animal shelter with heartwarming results.

## How is the SPCA of Luzerne County funded?

Your SPCA is a private, non-profit, 501(c)3, local animal welfare organization founded in 1957 by a group of concerned citizens who recognized the need to protect those who could not protect themselves. Like most animal welfare organizations, we are not affiliated with any other shelter and do not have a parent organization. We are not, in any way, a government agency. We are supported by the generosity of individuals, organizations, and corporations through monetary and in-kind donations, participation in our yearly events, and through beguest and trust giving. In 2018, we started contracting with local municipalities as their service provider for stray cats and dogs. These contracts provide additional funding each year.

### **MISSION STATEMENT:**

The SPCA of Luzerne County uplifts our community by providing compassion, comfort, and care to domestic companion animals through education, advocacy, protection, and a shelter/adoption program.

### **Our Intakes** Have Decreased

Our animal intake numbers have gone down by 74% over the last 40 years. This is a direct result of our spay/neuter programs and educational efforts which raise awareness about overpopulation.

#### SPAY AND NEUTER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Spaying/Neutering your pet is the only effective way to reduce the pet overpopulation problem. We realize that this vital surgery can be cost prohibitive for some families in our community. The SPCA of Luzerne County has offered a spay/neuter assistance program (S/NAP) for more than 10 years offering financial assistance for low income households in our county.

S/NAP spays/neuters over 600 house cats per year, made possible through the generosity of private donations and the cooperation of several area veterinarians.



We offer a senior-to-senior adoption program; providing low cost adoptions to senior citizens who choose to provide a loving home to a senior pet.



#### **END OF LIFE SERVICES**

Although no one wants to say goodbye to their beloved pet,

we are here to help when that time comes. We offer humane euthanasia services and cremation with return or burial of cremains. Our Rolling Green Pet Cemetery is the final resting place for hundreds of cherished pets. We can assist you in making these difficult final decisions showing deep respect for your companion.



# Wheezy

During September of 2022, the SPCA of Luzerne County received a cute, lively, young Pitbull puppy from a young woman who unfortunately could no longer care for her.

It will come as no surprise to learn that our Staff quickly fell in love with this 8-weekold cutie pie. Realizing how underweight she was, she was immediately placed on a vet recommended feeding schedule. After watching her initial encounter with food we saw that she gulped and wheezed while eating. It quickly became apparent that this sweet puppy had something very wrong. We named her, Lil' Wheezy.

After consulting a veterinarian, this young pup was diagnosed with megaesophagus. This serious condition made eating and swallowing food very difficult. Malnutrition and starvation were a real concern. Learning how to care for her special needs became a priority. We knew that she would need ongoing care and accommodations for her illness.

Wheezy didn't know she had problems. She thrived on all of the love and attention quickly learning to eat in a stand-up chair to ensure proper eating, prevent regurgitation, and make sure no food ended up in her lungs. The veterinarian and animal care team that continued her care were head-over-heels in love and Wheezy essentially became the Shelter mascot. The education department quickly looked for additional ways to help Wheezy such as a bouncy chair for after meals, adjusting the height of her feeding chair to accommodate her slowly growing body. This spunky pup began to put on weight and grew accustomed to getting in her chair for feeding.

She spent her first holiday with the veterinary assistant who cared for her daily making a lot of new friends along the way. She loves her human grandma, and her half-brother, a husky, and half-sister, a Lab mix. She made friends with Larry, an old TNR cat that resides in the executive director's office spending her days in different offices playing, napping, and stealing hearts.

One day a wonderful couple, who had adopted from us before, met Wheezy. They kept coming back to see her and this January they became her foster family. She is now spending her days going on adventures to Lowes and meeting domestic and farm animals that live on the property with her. Wheezy is still under our veterinary care, but is thriving despite the odds previously against her. Once again, we have watched an underdog become a first-class pet.






# **Cruelty continued**

# **Pumpkin**

On a cold winter's day in February 2022 the SPCA's Humane Society Police Officers responded to a complaint of animals being neglected. What our officers were confronted with was nothing short of heartbreaking. Two dogs: Pumpkin, a 7-month-old Pit mix, and her mother Ruby were living in complete filth. While Ruby was only slightly underweight, Pumpkin was not so lucky. Her prognosis was grim. When seized, she had a body score index of 1 out of 9. Pumpkin was emaciated, had pneumonia, and Lyme disease. Knowing that time was not on Pumpkin's side, our officers immediately took her to Northeast Veterinary Referral Hospital. Due to her condition and diagnosis, she spent her first few nights in our custody at the emergency veterinary clinic with 24-hour care. She received multiple fluid infusions, urinalysis tests, x-rays, nebulizer





March 3rd, she was again discharged back to the SPCA in guarded, but optimistic condition. Back at the shelter it was time for full on TLC. The staff and volunteers at the SPCA understand a successful recovery does not only involve the right medical care. Pumpkin needed to feel loved. An entire team of people stepped up to the plate, spending time with Pumpkin, letting her sleep in their offices, curl up on their laps, and show her the love all puppies deserve. Every day that passed she began to gain weight, trust humans again, and gain strength in her back legs. In just two short months, Pumpkin made a full recovery!

If we had to pick one word to describe her, it would be fighter. She got her forever home in April WITH HER MOTHER Ruby. During the holiday season, her humans stopped by on a Saturday to say hello. We asked them how the girls were and they went and brought them back. We were thrilled to see them and how she has grown up! She is now healthy and happy with an Amazing Family.




