HUMANE OFFICER POLICE WORK

We often say that our humane officers work tirelessly to protect the animals of Luzerne County. This is a job with no end and it's never easy. This year we had a few cases that were particularly severe. There have been multiple cases involving dozens of animals in need of our help. Investigations led to warrants and the transport of many vans full of animals to our shelter. NOVA

Nova was found clinging to life in June 2021. Nova is doing great working with the Pittston Police Department. She is healthy, strong, and patrolling the streets. The investigation into who abandoned

Nova is still open, but the important part is that she recovered and will never have to worry about being left again.



PEANUT BUTTER AND DUCKY

In the beginning of December, we came to you with two more dogs found emaciated and brought to the shelter. While we have not found any information on who did this to them, both Peanut Butter (shown above) and Ducky are progressing nicely, putting on weight, and coming into their own a little more every day. They are being loved by the staff and volunteers



BUBBA

Bubba's story started in October, 2020. This senior boy came to the shelter in rough shape and all because of a good Samaritan, he has a chance to live the next chapter of his life. After being in our care

for over 12 months, the court finally gave custody of this sweet boy to the SPCA. Then right after Thanksgiving his new momma came and picked him up.


The Giving Spirit
